Thanks to everyone who signed the petition highlighted in the **January e bulletin.** The Department for Education has now confirmed **Mary Seacole's** place as a leading black role model within the national curriculum for history.

3. Enough food for everyone IF

Hunger is the greatest scandal of our age. It kills more people than AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis combined. One in eight people on our planet are hungry. Two million children die each year because of malnutrition. Yet we produce enough food to feed everyone. The problem is not a shortage of food. There are deep inequalities and rigged rules in the food system that mean the hungry do not get the food they need to live. The forces keeping people hungry include tax dodging, financial secrecy, land grabs and too little investment in small-scale agriculture. Over 100 organisations have joined together to demand an end to hunger in the **IF** campaign. **In June the G8 Summit comes to Britain.** This is our chance to end the scandal of hunger. Our leaders will listen **if** we **act together** and **act now**.

Enough Food for Everyone....

IF we stop poor farmers being forced off their land, and use the available agricultural land to grow food for people, not bio-fuels for cars.

IF governments keep their promises on aid, invest to stop children dying from malnutrition and help the poorest people feed themselves through investment in small farmers.

IF governments stop big companies dodging tax in poor countries, so that millions of people can free themselves from hunger.

IF we force governments and investors to be honest and open about the deals they make in the poorest countries that stop people getting enough food.

The more of us involved then the greater the pressure we can put on world leaders to tackle these IFs in 2013. **IF** our leaders take action then we can start to have enough food for everyone.

5. Fairtrade Fortnight 25 February - 10 March

How far will you go for Fairtrade in 2013? is the slogan for this year's Fairtrade Fortnight. In 2013 the aim is to take Fairtrade further, and everyone's help is needed to reach more farmers and workers who urgently need a better deal from trade. Why not hold a Coffee Morning serving Fairtrade tea, coffee and sugar with local milk and cakes made with local eggs and Fairtrade sugar and chocolate? Or a competition for the best banana cake made with Fairtrade bananas? And for Sunday 3 March perhaps a special service round the Fairtrade and local theme. 6. Climate Week 4-10 March 2013

Climate Week is the UK's biggest climate change campaign. This year we are calling on **your** congregation to take part on Sunday 10 March as part of your weekly worship. Here is how you can get involved:

- **Climate Week Swap** hold an exchange event where everyone brings items such as clothes, books or children's toys that they no longer want to trade for others.
- Bubble & Squeak pass around the recipe on the Climate Week website for a low-carbon Sunday meal.
- Green Roundtable arrange a discussion on ways to lower your church's carbon footprint.

7. Schools invited to sign up to Spirit of Romero Day 20 March

A new initiative is encouraging schools and colleges to unite in showing solidarity and support for social justice campaigns, including the current **Food Enough for Everyone IF** campaign. **Just1** has arranged for them to sign up as **Spirit of Romero Schools** and to set aside a few minutes in assembly or classroom on **20 March**, the **Spirit of Romero Day**. Organiser Hugh Gibbons says: "The purpose is to have an opportunity to appreciate, thank and

acclaim the world's 'voices for the voiceless' – the millions of campaigners for social justice, peace, equality, dignity and human rights."

Schools are also encouraged to support the **End Hunger campaigns** being directed at leaders of the **G8 gathering in June** including the **Food Enough for All IF campaign**, of which CAFOD, ScIAF, Trocaire and Progressio and Just1 are members. In the UK, School Councils are invited to write a letter to the Secretary of State for International Development. Hugh says: "Each year, many Catholic schools and colleges pay tribute to the life and legacy of Archbishop Oscar Romero in their own way around the anniversary of his assassination on 24 March. It seemed that getting young people acting in his spirit for social justice would be a good idea all round — especially as a contribution to the **Year of Faith.** You need to be 18 to take part in the formal on-line and paper petitions to the Prime Minister but schools can commend the campaigns to the leaders of governments."

The first day of Spring, Wednesday **20 March**, has been chosen for the first **Spirit of Romero Day** which falls in the run up to the annual **United Nations Day for the Right to Truth Concerning Gross Human Rights Violations and for the Dignity of Victims.** The UN has set this for **24 March**, as a tribute to the life and legacy of Romero. Schools are invited to nominate a member of staff or governing body to become a Friend of the ecumenical UK charity **Romero Trust** and to display one of the small wooden Romero Crosses hand-made by family artists in El Salvador. Bishops can play a part too: the Spirit of Romero website has a page showing **Palmaditas en la Espada** – a couple of sentences to give a public pat on the back to schools in dioceses for their support for social justice through the years. 8. Pax Christi issues statement on Drones

The British Section of **Pax Christi**, the international Catholic movement for peace, has issued a statement outlining its concerns at the development and use of armed unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs), commonly known as **Drones**. Pax Christi is deeply concerned about the rapid growth in the development and use of armed unmanned aerial vehicles. In theory these might possibly be used in a way that conforms to Just War teaching - such as a war declared by legitimate authority, with discrimination between combatants and civilians. However, UAVs are not currently used in this way.

Pax Christi suggests now is the time to challenge their development, before UAV's become enshrined a 'legitimate' weapons system and play a deeper role in the tragedy of warfare. Pax Christi believes that they contravene existing moral and legal codes that govern war and the conduct of war. According to Pat Gaffney, General Secretary of Pax Christi, their low cost, ease of use and minimal military casualty rate make them attractive to politicians. They insulate Western public opinion from the true horrors of modern warfare and the use of drones means that decisions leading towards war and military intervention will be more not less likely. The UK is involved in the development of its own UK-operated systems and has a contract with the Israeli company, Elbit Systems and Thales UK for the Watchkeeper unmanned aerial vehicle due to be operational by the RAF in Spring 2013.

Pax Christi is a member of the **Drone Campaign network** which is already campaigning for an end to the secrecy surrounding the use of British drones in Afghanistan in order to encourage proper public debate. This should include the reasons for individual drone strikes and the number of people killed.
