3. New CDF head on 'My experiences with liberation theology'

Since the appointment of Bishop Gerhard Ludwig Müller of Regensburg, Germany, as Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, there has been renewed interest in a speech Bishop Müller gave about his experiences with liberation theology in 2008, upon receiving an honorary doctorate from the Pontifical Catholic University of Peru. Below are some extracts from a lengthy discourse:

For me, liberation theology is linked to the face of Gustavo Gutierrez. ... A seminar led by Gustavo Gutierrez turned me from academic reflection on a new theological concept to experience with the men and women for whom this theology had been developed. This reversal in focus from the priority of theory before practice to the three step "see, judge, act" process, has been decisive in my own theological development.

... How one can speak of God in the face of human suffering, of the poor who don't have sustenance for their children, or the right to medical assistance, or access to education, who are excluded from social and cultural life, marginalized and considered a burden and a threat to the lifestyle of the wealthy few. These poor are not an anonymous mass. Each one of them has a face.

... A brief reading of the book "We Drink From Our Own Wells" by Gustavo Gutierrez shows that liberation theology is based on deep spirituality. Its substratum is the following of Christ, the encounter with God through prayer, participation in the life of the poor and oppressed, the willingness to listen to their cry for freedom and the splendour of the children of God. It's joining in their struggle to put an end to exploitation and oppression, in their yearning for respect of human rights and their demand for fair participation in the cultural and political life in democracy.

... This is the path to liberation as Jesus teaches in the Gospel: "No one can serve two masters, God and mammon", and elsewhere it is specified, "the love of money is the root of all evil." (1 Timothy 6:10) The fundamental choice between the option for money and power on the one hand, and God and love on the other, presents itself today too to every individual person, and both to all communities and societies and to nations and alliances. ... Entire continents such as Africa and South America, are now being marginalized. A fraction of the world's population divides the resources among themselves, thereby contributing to the premature death of millions of children and to most of the world's population living in disastrous circumstances.

4. CAFOD calls on review of World Bank rankings to put needs of poorest first

In the build up to the World Bank's release of its tenth annual Doing Business report, aid agency CAFOD is calling on the organisation to remember its only remit is helping poor countries reduce poverty. Doing Business is a World Bank tool ranking the business-friendliness of different governments according to a checklist of primarily deregulatory reforms. Regardless of the realities facing poor countries, Doing Business follows a regime of one size fits all, which can undermine progress on development as governments are encouraged to implement policies which can favour business but not their own population and economy.

CAFOD's economist Christina Chang said: "The rankings skew vital resources away from small and microenterprises which account for the majority of jobs and are critical in reducing poverty. It is not just that some reforms promoted by the Doing Business rankings might be irrelevant for the majority of businesses in developing countries – in some instances they are harmful to poor men and women."

In Zambia, an inter-ministerial committee has been set up to work exclusively on moving Zambia up the Doing Business rankings. Despite the majority of jobs in poorer countries being in small businesses, Zambia's small business programme receives under £1 million a year in funding. When Zambia has succeeded in hitting 6th place globally on the Bank's ranking for getting credit, why would it feel the need to help the 98% of small business owners who report lack of credit as their biggest problem?

Under pressure from civil society groups and disgruntled governments, new World bank President Jim Yong Kim has ordered a timely review of the Doing Business project on the eve of its tenth anniversary. In a new briefing paper, CAFOD highlights the anti-development priorities of the Doing Business rankings and calls on the review to be an independent and comprehensive overhaul that puts poor men and women first. 5. CAAT Wins 'alternative Nobel Peace Prize'

The **Campaign Against the Arms Trade** has won a major award for their 'innovative and effective campaigning against the global trade in arms'...Pat Gaffney from Pax Christi said: "This is a wonderful recognition of the years of research and campaigning by the CAAT team and supporters all around the country. CAAT's work in challenging the UK's arms trade has been consistent and thorough - exposing in a public way the horrors of the arms trade and taking political and commercial actions to oppose this trade.

The 2012 Right Livelihood Awards were announced in Stockholm by Ole von Uexkull, Executive Director, and Monika Griefahn, Co-Chair and Jury member of the Right Livelihood Award Foundation. Other winners are environment campaigner Hayrettin Karaca from Turkey; Sima Samar from Afghanistan for her work with women's rights; and American Gene Sharp for his work on the promotion of non-violent resistance in conflict areas around the world. Ole von Uexkull said: "This year's group of four Laureates highlights the essential conditions for global peace and security: effective nonviolent resistance, a recognition that the arms industry is part of the problem, human and women's rights, and the preservation of our precious ecological resources."

The Awards will be presented at a ceremony in the Swedish Parliament on 7 December. Founded in 1980, the Right Livelihood Awards are presented annually in the Swedish Parliament and are often referred to as 'Alternative Nobel Prizes'. They were introduced "to honour and support those offering practical and exemplary answers to the most urgent challenges facing us today".

On the 18th November, the Church will mark Prisoners' Sunday, a day of prayer, reflection and action for prisoners, ex-offenders, their children and families. It marks the start of Prisons Week which this year runs until 24th November. The theme for this year is **'Taking the Path to Life'** – a hope rooted in the Christian belief that the divine spark is in all people, that no-one is beyond redemption, and that change can and does take place.

There are now over 87,000 people in prison in the UK, meaning that prisoners and their families need our help more than ever. Tragically, more children are now affected by the imprisonment of a parent than by divorce. Prisoners need the support of parishes to move away from a life of crime and take the path to life – they need our hope, faith, love and support in order to do this. We can in surprising ways disarm even the most hardened offender.

During the Church's forthcoming Year of Faith, it is particularly fitting that we keep faith with those whom our society typically overlooks or ignores.
